Meet the President: ANNA MOLLER ELECTED STUDENT GOVERNMENT PRESIDENT

Honors student Anna Moller, a junior Psychology major from Copenhagen, Denmark, was elected to serve as only the second president of UNG's consolidated student government, serving students from all campuses. We sat down with Anna to ask her about the presidency, her plans, and how Honors has helped shape her trajectory:

What are you looking forward to in this new role?

I'm very excited to hold the power and influence to really make a difference to better the student experience and give back to a community that have opened its arms for me as an international student and made me want to stay in the US long-term!

What are your specific goals?

I have three main goals for my term: I want to facilitate more transparency and shared governance, growing SGA's presence and influence across the

campuses and encouraging more students to get involved and excited about the power they hold as students.

I also want to address disparities and increased student stress focusing on the aftermath of the pandemic and how that has changed the student experience and increased the need for more flexibility and accessibility.

Lastly, I want to push for a more sustainable culture and initiate sustainable practices university-wide.



In what ways will this position challenge you?

It is the biggest leadership position I have ever held, so I do not doubt that I will experience unfamiliar situations where I'm the person that needs to act. This will at times be challenging, I'm sure. Having the courage to lead in uncertain times and take action even when there is no simple solution is something I have prepared myself through several experiences and involvement these past years.

How have you prepared for the presidency?

Joining the Honors Program helped me realize my potential both academically and leadership wise and supported me to go more outside my comfort zone and get involved on campus. This previous year I have led the Sustainability Club on campus, been an Multicultural Student Affairs Ambassador, done research on culture change, completed the co-curricular Cultural Competence Certificate and Leadership Certificate, and changed my minor to Leadership. These experiences have collectively prepared me to take on the SGA Presidency and lead by doing but with a foundation in current science.



How are you spending the summer?

This summer I will be going home to Denmark to see my family and finalize my research in culture change which will culminate in two second-author publications. The research is a 5-year action research project with the Danish Agriculture and Food Council, which I have been a part of for two years, using therapy to reveal the underlying mechanisms needed for transformational culture change in the workplace. Over the summer I will also prepare for the GRE as I will be applying for graduate school during my coming senior year.



ALUMNI DISPATCHES FROM TAIWAN

2021 Honors graduates Abigail Meyers and Kat Torres met for the first time halfway around the world in Taiwan, where both are currently serving as **Fulbright English Teaching Assistants**. The two have embraced life in Taiwan, thriving in their classrooms and enjoying weekends and holidays to explore. Meyers credits her UNG experience with preparing her to be adaptable: "UNG really excelled at motivating me to put my best foot forward in all circumstances ...using that in Taiwan has helped me take on

challenges and not feel overwhelmed."

Torres agrees: "The UNG Honors program introduced me to academic, research, and study abroad opportunities, which solidified my interests in public service, international affairs, and cultural exchange. My experiences in the Honors program sharpened my soft skills in intercultural communication and adaptability, which prepared me for the Taiwan ETA and helped me earn earn a Pickering Fellowship."

"WELCOME HOME": CONNECTING HONORS TO THE COMMUNITY

As a current or former Honors student, one of your earliest experiences in the Honors Program likely occurred in HNRS 1000: Introduction to Honors Academic Inquiry. HNRS 1000 is offered to all first-year students in the fall semester. This course is designed to build community among new Honors students and teach research and academic writing skills. During the Fall 2021 semester, HNRS 1000 was revamped, taking the meaning of "community" to the next level.

Themed "Welcome Home," the updated HNRS 1000 course on the Dahlonega campus fostered connections between first-year students and their new community. In partnership with UNG's Appalachian Studies Center (ASC), HNRS 1000 students participated in community service opportunities within Lumpkin County and engaged in research projects related to their volunteer work. Students became immersed in their new community through visiting sites like the historic Vickery House, the Mount Hope Cemetery, and the 1884 Lumpkin County Jail and Museum. Visiting these sites was a chance for Dahlonega campus students to learn the history of the place they now call home.

In early fall, a panel of volunteer coordinators introduced students to the many service opportunities available through the ASC including work with the Hometown Harvest community garden, UNG food pantry, Lumpkin County Schools, or Mount Hope Cemetery. Students eagerly began their service-learning research projects and gained a variety of skills, from restoring headstones to harvesting







vegetables. Students used their service projects as springboards for their research projects; for instance, one group of students volunteering at Mount Hope explored Southern funerary art, while a group serving at the food pantry investigated the impact of hunger on college-age students.

The Mount Hope volunteers were involved in one particularly special project: They assisted with placing over 250 aluminum grave markers on the previously unmarked gravesites of Lumpkin County's African American citizens.

The HNRS 1000 research projects culminated in a paper, a public deliverable, and an academic poster session presented to the campus community. Their posters reached an even wider audience when students were invited to display their work at Dahlonega City Hall between January and March of this year.

Notably, the students' efforts were recognized in April when the Honors Program was awarded a **Certificate of Appreciation from the Lumpkin County Historical Society**.

Society president Chris Worick, who mentored the Mount Hope volunteers, said, "The Honors Program students were instrumental in helping accomplish more in one semester than we had hoped for, and we look forward to working with a new class of students again in the future." The new iteration of HNRS 1000 was a successful and rewarding experience for students.

What are your long-term goals?

I plan to go to pharmacy school and hope to work on Pharmacovigilance. I have been motivated by the opioid epidemic—I watch documentaries about how lives are destroyed and families suffer, and I really want to help. I hope to work with drug testing to determine side effects of drugs.

What has your Honors experience been like?

Last year, I took Honors English Composition I and II with Dr. Jessica Walker and Dr. Joe Seale. Dr. Walker had us work on a semesterlong project, and we could be as creative as we wanted, which was fun. Dr. Seale was so passionate about his subject! I loved being in small classes with other students who were all in the program.

I also did a Biology upgrade with Dr. Neal Lin, which allowed me to pursue research on desensitization of Opioid receptors.

What are your summer plans?

The research I completed with Dr. Lin really helped me to get accepted into the REU this summer at Georgia Southern. I am working with Dr. Eric Gato in his lab on causes of pancreatic cancer, investigating how toxins and other environmental contaminants contribute to insulin resistance. I am excited about how this research will build on the research I did with Dr. Lin.

What are you looking forward to next year in Honors?

I could not have had a better first year in college—it was great, but I was very focused on my studies. Next year, I am excited about getting out in the community more and volunteering.

John Hayes (Chemistry, 2013) is currently serving a Head Distiller at Cotton & Reed, a rum distillery in Washington, DC. Since joining the distillery in 2019, Cotton & Reed has earned

In the past year, the Honors Advisory Council (HAC) continued our work in support of the Honors Program through several events and fundraising efforts.

In fall 2021, the HAC hosted a pizza night fundraiser at Your Pie Dahlonega. The event, held on Thursday, November 4, provided an opportunity for alumni, students, HAC members, and HP administrators to socialize over dinner. Your Pie donated 20% of all its profits from the evening's sales to the Honors Program.

In spring, the HAC hosted our annual career workshop. While this event was held in person in 2019 and 2020, it was fully virtual in 2021. In 2022, we tried a new hybrid approach. On Friday, February 25, students and some alumni gathered in person in the Convocation Center at the Dahlonega campus and engaged online with alumni professionals across the country.

Most recently, HAC members volunteered at the HP tent during Parent-Alumni Weekend's REUNITE event held on the Price Memorial Hall patio on Saturday, April 23. It was a beautiful day and many alumni stopped by to chat. We are looking forward to participating in this event again next year!


Shannon Truax
